

Jürgen Gerdes resigns his mandate as Member of the Management Board of Deutsche Post DHL Group

Bonn, June 12, 2018: Jürgen Gerdes (53), Member of the Management Board responsible for Corporate Incubations at Deutsche Post DHL Group will resign his mandate today.

The Group and Jürgen Gerdes have agreed on an early termination of his board membership by mutual consent and on the best of terms amid diverging views on the future strategic focus of the company. Gerdes steps down from his mandate as of today and will leave the company by June 30, 2018.

The board mandate for Corporate Incubations will be taken over by Thomas Ogilvie, Member of the Board for Personnel and Labour Director. Before joining the Corporate Board Ogilvie was Executive Vice President Corporate Development and in charge of the Group strategy. He is very familiar with the projects driven forward by Corporate Incubations.
